

# Financial activities during 2019/2020



## Stotfold Christmas Lights

In December 2019, we held the town's 5<sup>th</sup> Christmas Lights Switch On event. The Christmas Lights Committee continued to work hard throughout the year to encourage new businesses to join the town's display, buying additional sets of lights where required.

We are very lucky to have the support of Baldock Rotary, who have donated many of our lighting panels and have provided their knowledge and expertise from setting up displays in Baldock.

Each year we continue to look to expand the displays, however provision of lights, erection and dismantling of them, and the switch on event itself all comes at a cost. During the 2019/2020 financial year, we have added to the Christmas Lights funds by holding a very popular quiz night, donation tins at various businesses around the town and donations from those businesses. Our newest attempt to raise funds asks people to make a donation in return for a second hand book — see our office foyer! The Town Council has also agreed to put £4,000 into the funds this year, which greatly helps with the ongoing costs.



### General Power of Competence

In early 2018/2019 financial year, the Council resolved that it was eligible to adopt the General Power of Competence (GPC). The conditions for eligibility are set out in a statutory instrument, but in summary, require Council to meet a relevant electoral mandate and confirm that it has an appropriately qualified Clerk.

Councils with GPC no longer need to ask whether they have a specific power to act. The GPC gives local authorities "the power to do anything that individuals may generally do" as long as they don't break other laws.

This means that when Stotfold Town Council considers expenditure against a project, purchase or service, as long as it meets the rules of GPC, it may act. Similarly, when Council considers awarding grants to local organisations in its twice yearly grant application process, it no longer has to rely on a specific power set down in statute. This gives more scope to benefit the community.

Following the May 2019 Town Council elections, with at least two thirds of Councillors declared elected, and the Clerk having the appropriate qualification, we were able to reaffirm our eligibility to adopt the General Power of Competence.

# Coming up during 2020/2021



Following concerns from residents and the Town Council about speeds and volume of traffic using Norton Road, Central Beds Highways and the Town Council are working on a matched funding project to provide traffic calming measures to this road. The Town Council has budgeted £22,500 as its 50% contribution.



For the last two years, the Town Council has financially contributed towards the work of Grand Union Housing's Youth Participation Team, for their work with the young people of our community. For the 2020/2021 we have budgeted £10,000 for this very valuable work



### Grants to the community

For the 2020/2021 financial year, the Town Council has budgeted £12,000 for grants to organisations in our community. The sum is distributed twice-yearly, considered each April and September and grants may be applied for any amount from £50 to £1,500.

Applications for grants must be to directly benefit Stotfold, or part of it, or all or some of its inhabitants. Organisations will be eligible for consideration only if they provide a social, welfare or educational benefit, and have an active local branch or committee. Applications from individuals will not be considered. We will consider applications for specified running costs but will not provide financial assistance for wages or staff. We also cannot fund any events that have already occurred, equipment already purchased or works already started or completed.
